clinics with help from Boston Celtics assistant coach John Jennings.

Houghton, who is planning a return trip to Bosnia next summer, was both over-whelmed by the devastation and uplifted by the resiliency of the people.

He visited the memorial at a Tuzla market where 71 chil-dren died in a Serb attack last year. His friendship with a 21-year-old paraplegic named Farouk gave him promise that conditions can improve.

Farouk, who keeps a copy of the CNN footage of the sniper shooting that severed his spinal cord, has begun organizing a wheelchair basketball league in Sarajevo and is getting his apartment retrofitted. Houghton, who came hack Tuesday, is already making plans to bring him to Pomona to teach him about wheelchair sports. wheelchair sports.

Victims of the civil war have now become prisoners in the primitive hospitals, unable to move into mainstream life because the city lacks wheelchair access. Many cannot rejoin families who live in high-rise apartments with nonworking elevators.

As the city of Sarajevo begins to rebuild, Houghton impressed upon the International Rescue Committee and other officials to incorporate handicapped access into the

He knows they still have a way to go.

Houghton attended a ribbon-cutting ceremony for a new, concrete ramp added to the city's post office. But he pointed out the builder forgot the curb cut.

Duarte negotiating for trash contract

City plans meetings with four haulers, expects to reach an agreement by August

DUARTE — The City Council has initiated negotiations for the city's trash contract, officials said Wednesday.

City staff will be meeting with Browning-Ferris Indus-tries, Eurrice Waste Industries, Waste Management, and Zakanoff Recycling Services in hopes of reaching an agreement with one mext month, said Assistant City Manager Mike Yelton

The haulers are the inalists in a seven-month open hidding process for contracts in Bradbury and Duarte. Bradbury au-thorized negotiations with the four companies last week.

The contractor selected would replace Newco Waste Systems Inc., of Riverside. Duarte's con-tract expires Nov. 1

bridged the language gap with Andy Houghton.

Originally, the bidding pro-cess included Monrovia and Ar-cadia. Newco declined to sub-mit a bid because it challenged Monrovia's claim that its contract expired on July 1, 1996. That city dropped out of the bidding in March after a judge ruled the contract doesn't end until the year 2000.

Areadia dropped out soon af-ter and reach an agreement with Newco last week for an eight-year contract extension.
